


Vagner's Greenhouse

Wagner's Greenhouse

We've been around for sixty-three years, two generations, and even a global pandemic! We operate year-round, and offer spring flowers and vegetable plants, fall mums, poinsettias and Christmas décor, and Easter flowers. We grow about 95% of our plants from seed. Our potting soil is a special mix that we have formulated and make at the greenhouse. All of our original structures are still in working condition and used today!





Spring Planting Tip



- The safest time to plant outdoors in our area is usually after May 20th or after the chance of frost (when the temperatures are consistently staying above 50 degrees at night).
- Full sun is the best location for a vegetable garden (at least 6-8 hours of direct sunlight).
- Weeds are the enemy in a garden. Keep them under control by removing before they go to seed and by weeding often.
- Be sure to give your plants ample space to grow all summer long. Crowded plants don't produce as much and can suffer from competing for nutrients. Plants can also be more prone to disease and cross pollination when planted too close together.
- You don't need a lot of space to get started! You can start off by growing something as simple as a tomato or pepper plant in a large pot or a bucket!
- To help young plants avoid wind and sun burn, it can be helpful to ease them into the outdoors for a few days before planting them directly in your garden.
- It is a good idea to amend your soil so that weeds are easier to pull, and water and oxygen can more easily penetrate the soil. You can do this by adding any type of organic material to your soil, such as compost, garden soil, mushroom manure, etc.
- It is important to check the light requirements for any flowers to avoid burning of leaves and foliage and to produce the most flowers.



Some of our most popular flowers are: Impatiens, Vinca, Marigolds, Petunias & Geraniums.

Spotlight On Weatherbury Farm

Twists, Turns & The Journey Continues for Independence Township's Own Certified Organic Grower and Miller of Grains (and grass-fed beef farmer and much more!)

Weatherbury Farm's journey to 2023 has had many twists and turns. Today, owned by Dale, Marcy and Nigel Tudor, Weatherbury grows organic grains and mills them into flour; they also raise grass-fed beef.

The beginning was in 1980. During an assignment to Germany, Dale, who worked for Mobay (now Bayer), and Marcy spent their six weeks of German Vacation plus many weekends touring Europe and staying in pensiones and guest houses - and loved the experience. So much so that they decided a bed and breakfast would be in their future.

On returning to the U.S., with baby Nigel in tow, they started looking for a house on 10 acres, but fell in love with what was to become Weatherbury Farm (with its 100+ acres). The rest, as they say, is history.

The bed and breakfast opened its doors with two farmhouse bed & breakfast rooms in 1992 but soon segued into educational (but fun) farm vacations. The Weatherbury Farm's Kid Program (for kids of all ages) was born. Included were daily chores with Farmer Dale, where he talked about farming and agriculture, and 15 minutes of chores often stretched into 2 hours. The farm lodging accommodations increased in 1998 when the old summer kitchen was restored into two rooms (finished just as the first guests were pulling in the driveway).

A bit earlier, in the spring of 1997, the Tudors dismantled an old livery stable located in nearby Washington, PA and moved the building piece by piece to farm and rebuilt it as a bank barn. The Livery was renovated, opening in May 2004, into three two-story suites with a hall on the bottom floor for breakfast and events.

When Dale and Marcy purchased the farm, they also purchased a small herd of Hereford Cattle. In late 2005, Dale & Marcy attended a

workshop on rotational grazing and began to segue their focus from farm vacations to more farming – raising grass fed beef for sale to the public.

Meanwhile, Nigel had grown up and studied blacksmithing in Germany. Things were going well with his artistic blacksmithing until the downturn of



2008. At this time, shortly after the Tudors had begun raising grass fed beef, Nigel decided that people would always have to eat and proposed that if they were going to grow grains for straw (they were keeping the calves longer and needed straw for bedding for the barn) -- why not make them organic grains that people could eat. So, in the fall of 2008, grains were added to the mix, this not only offered a new income stream but also synergies that made the farm

more sustainable.



In 2009 (albeit with lots of paperwork), the croplands were certified organic, and the first grain crops were harvested. Over the years, additional neighboring farms were added to the land the

harvesting

Tudors farmed. Today they farm 220 rolling acres, of which 65 acres are grains. The Tudors raise four wheats for bread and pastry flour as well as Buckwheat, Rye, Corn, Oats, Spelt, Einkorn and Emmer. In addition to being milled into flour, some of the grains are available rolled (spelt, einkorn and emmer) and as grain berries. They also raise Black Turtle, Small Red Merlot Beans and Navy Beans. The farm is unique in that everything from putting the seed in the ground to putting the flour in the bag is done on the farm.

Weatherbury is one of only a handful of farms in the country that mill local flour (from grains grown on their farm) and the only farm that has complete traceability of the flour back to the field with our Grain Tracker, a QR code that is on every bag that links to information about how and where the grains for the flour were grown. **Each** month, a flour pickup is hosted on the farm with orders due 10 days

prior. This time frame gives Nigel time to freshly mill all the flours.

With the increase in farming and milling, they reduced the number of days they hosted guests at the farm vacation and closed entirely in August 2017. There are only so many hours in a day. And the journey continues...

Nigel has almost completed building an outdoor wood fired oven. The oven will be used for classes to teach bakers of all skill levels by

professional bakers. They also plan to open a "seed to loaf" bakery. The oven is located outside the Livery with its indoor hall for class space and a kitchen which will be transformed into a bakery. So the Tudors continue as they began with ideas aplenty, weeding through them, trying them to see what works best for Weatherbury Farm.

The Avella Sportsmen's Club says a special **Thank You** to the many individuals, businesses, organizatons who donated financial support and time to help make the tournament a great success.












PUBLIC WORKS






PROJECT UNDER WAY

SEASONAL **MAINTENANCE**

The Spring season is when we focus on cleaning and shaping our ditches, and grading and crowning our gravel roads to prevent potholes and to achieve proper drainaae.

REPAIRED



Heavy rain in late March flooded and collapsed this old 15 inch culvert on Sugar Run Road, close to the Brashears Run intersection. We moved this up the priority list so we would not have to repair the road if it washed out. It was replaced with a new triple wall 18 inch plastic pipe, and installed in compliance with the new guidelines set by the Penn State Dirt and Gravel Program and the Washington County Conservation District.

Last summer we installed a catch basin and drainage on the Route 844 side of our lot because we were experiencing flooding from storm water run off. TIPS TO HELP FAMILIES STAY SAFE &

Summer is approaching fast and many children will be home alone or watching younger siblings. To help families stay safe this summer, the McDonald Police Department has created the following list of summer safety tips.

Parents are advised to discuss these safety tips with their children BEFORE they are home alone.

Guidelines for Parents Children Watching Younger Children:

- 1. In Pennsylvania, a law does not designate the exact age at which a child can stay home alone or watch other children.
- 2. Parents need to use a "reasonableness test."
 - **G.** Can your child, regardless of his or her age, act reasonably under the circumstances?
 - **3.** Detectives advise parents to consider the following:
 - Is your child mature enough to know what to do in an emergency?
 - If there is a fire, is your child mature enough to get out of the house?
 - Is he or she mature enough to get other children out of the house?



Safety Tips for Children Home Alone:

- 1. Always check with your parents before you go anywhere or do anything. Be sure to check-in regularly with your parents when you're not with them.
- **2.** Always take a friend with you when playing or going anywhere. It's safer and more fun.
- **3.** Don't be tricked by people who offer you special treats or gifts. Never accept anything from anyone without your parents permission.
- **4.** Stay safer when you're home alone:
 - Keep the door locked.
 - Do not open the door for or talk to anyone who stops by unless the person is a trusted family friend or relative, and the visit has been pre-approved by your parents or guardians.
 - Never telling anyone who calls that you're home by yourself.
 - Before you are home alone, talk to your parents about a neighbor or trusted adult you can call if you feel scared, uncomfortable, or there's an emergency
- **5.** Never go into a public restroom by yourself.
- **6.** Never go alone to malls, movies, video arcades, or parks. Take a friend with you, and always check first with your parents to make sure its okay.
- 7. Don't panic if you feel lost. Identify the safest place to go or person to ask for help in reuniting you with your parents or guardians. Safe helpers could be a uniformed law-enforcement or security officer, store salesperson with a name tag, person with a name tag who is working at the information booth. Never search for your parents or guardians on your own, and never go with anyone who is trying to reunite you with them.
- **8.** Be careful when you play.
 - Never take shortcuts unless you have your parents or guardians permission.
 - Don't play near busy streets or deserted areas.
- **9.** Don't wear clothes or carry items with your name on the outside.
 - Don't be confused just because a person you don't know calls out your name.
- **10.** Don't get into a vehicle or go near a vehicle with anyone in it unless you are with your parents or a trusted adult.
 - Never take a ride from anyone without checking first with your parents or guardians.
- **11.** Don't be afraid to say NO and GET AWAY from any situation making you feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused. TRUST YOUR FEELINGS, and be sure to TELL a trusted adult if anything happens to make you feel this way.

One Way We're Working to Bring Positive Change to Our Community

Homes that have turned from productive to disuse. Old, vacant, and abandoned properties that have become visible eyesores, nuisances, unsafe for the the surrounding neighborhood, fire hazards, objects of complaint for neighbors, potential contributions to further property value decline to adjacent properties, and negative symbols with the potential to cause spillover effects that can impact the community with things like increased crime, increased risk to public health and welfare and increased cost for our township.

Independence Township has gone through the pre-demolition process for some of these derelict houses within our community, and in the past month we said good-bye to a couple of these old problem houses. We cannot say what is to become of the space, but removing these old problem buildings makes way for open, clean, green spaces, a positive impact on their neighborhoods and our community as a whole.





SAFE MEDICATION DISPOSAL

Keeping Kids Safe Makes Sense to Us

Independence Township offers a safe way to dispose of OTC and prescription medications. The disposal box is located inside the lobby of the municipal building at 34 Campbell Street in Avella.

The lobby hours are: Monday - Friday 9:00 AM - 2:00 PM.

Examples of items that can be placed in the box are: over-the-counter medication, pet medication, prescription samples, unwanted or expired prescription drugs, vitamins and supplements.

Items NOT accepted are: Illegal drugs, liquids, inhalers, aerosol cans, thermometers and hydrogen peroxide.

Help support a safe environment for the children in our community by using this disposal to get rid of your unwanted medications, and prevent the misuse of medications by adolescents and accidental childhood poisonings.

Our full time staff currently consists of myself, my mom, and of course, the most important workforce at the barn: our 16 staff horses we have on site. We have all makes and models, from 3-foot-high ponies to 6-foothigh Percherons and drafts. So come one and all; we have



a model to fit your needs. We also get help from some volunteers at Memories in the Makin', and we are always looking for more help. This summer we hope to be able to do some internships with students or adults who have a special love for working with animals, special needs individuals and the general public. All staff members and volunteers are required to pass all background checks and paperwork required by the government as well as our standards.

A new division of our organization, Gunny's Ridge at Memories in the Makin', now provides equine therapy services to veterans and first responders. We're so honored to have the opportunity to work with veterans and veteran groups. This is something new we were

approached about, and are happy to say that the veterans we are currently working with love it, and their families tell us it really helps with the different issues and unique challenges they face. We receive similar feedback from all of our students and families who are in our equine therapy program. As the owner this makes me feel great about myself, the organization and our mission. It always has been my dream to help others in need through working with horses.



When I decided to leave our little town and head off to college to learn more about horses and equine therapy I was scared and nervous. I was a young, small town farm girl headed out into the big world to follow my dreams to help others and rescue every horse I could. I knew my hometown is where I loved and wanted to be, so after graduating and working some other facilities thoughout the U.S., I became confident enough to bring back all I'd learned to my own shingle. I pitched the idea of opening an equine therapy facility to my fam-

ily. My family had seen first hand how equine therapy had helped me when I was a little girl (I suffered a traumatic brain injury as an infant and was non-verbal for years. Only when my Mom brought me back to Avella and got me my first pony and began equine therapy did I begin speaking at age 5). So, with the full support of my family, and all hands on-deck, they helped me rebuild an old run-down barn and arena that was bought to get my dreams started.

I quickly learned I couldn't afford to rescue every horse I came across, but also learned that I can still help those who need it. And yes, some of our horses are rescues who also love helping those who need it and are happy to have a home and get fed everyday. We also have some horses that are donated for use, but just like our human staff, our equine staff must meet certain qualifications and be in good physical health and able to work 5-6 days a week.

I can't express how appreciative I am of the help I've received from family, friends, and especially the community, in making Memories in the Makin' a reality. In the way horses and equine therapy helped me so much as a child, it has all come full circle, in that I now have the opportunity and resources to share this amazing avenue of therapy with others in need.

Sugar Run Stables is the for-profit side, which offers riding lessons, events, birthday parties, horse shows and camps for those who are not in a special needs situation.

The facility that we revived is known as the Sugar Run Stables and it is the facility that is home to Memories in the Makin'. Sugar Run Stables is the for-profit side of my business, which also does equine riding and events for those who are not in a special needs situation. The lessons and events, such as birthday parties, horse shows and camps allow us to generate income for general upkeep of the building and grounds and day to day expenses not related to Mem-
